\$250,000	Day Shelter: A 900-square-foot day shelter. Homeless men, women, and children will be welcomed indoors year-round to escape the elements, rest, and work towards housing.	Available
\$250,000	Kitchen: A brand new commercial kitchen will feature new appliances and more workspace to prepare 30,000+ meals each year.	Available
\$100,000	Food Pantry: A 1,100-square-foot grocery receiving and distribution room with a client waiting area and partner agency outreach station. The space will also be used for daily Soup Kitchen distributions, and to host workshops and other events.	Available
\$100,000	Lobby: This space welcomes donors and volunteers, as well as guests seeking shelter, employment assistance, medical care, and other services. This space includes an accessible restroom that is open to the public.	Available
\$100,000	Mechanical Room: The home of the unglamorous but vital HVAC systems. The facility will have ventilation and a modern heating and cooling system that keeps our guests warm in the winter and keeps our kitchen cool in the summer.	Duct Dynasty
\$75,000	Medical Exam 1: A modern doctor's office that will allow for expanded hours and medical services, providing essential care to people without insurance.	Spectrum Healthcare Partners
\$75,000	Medical Exam 2: A modern doctor's office that will allow for expanded hours and medical services, providing essential care to people without insurance.	Available
\$50,000	Reception + Client Services Office: This is the heart of the building, where donations are received and clients pick up supplies, make appointments, access the shelter, sign up to shower and do laundry, and receive help with other services.	Atlantic Charitable Fund
\$50,000	Health Access Center: A waiting room for patient check in; when the clinic is closed, a private space for mental health case workers to meet clients for intakes, assessments, and meetings.	Dr. Thomas & Bethel Shields

\$50,000	Supply Room: Nearly three times the size of the current supply room, this space will stock coats and boots in all sizes, hygiene items, blankets, and other essentials.	Norway Savings Bank
\$50,000	Employment Center: Staff assist clients at professional workstations to write resumes and complete job applications.	Androscoggin Bank
\$50,000	Director's Office: A private office for the Center's director provides a secure and focused environment that is important for confidentiality, concentration, private meetings, administrative work, and professional leadership.	Phyllis Vail
\$50,000	Stability Services Office: A private room where partner agencies can offer mental health, housing, and other intervention services on site.	Maine Community Bank
\$50,000	Recovery Services Office: A private room where partner agencies can offer substance misuse counseling, recovery coaching, and other related services.	Available
\$30,000	Walk-in Refrigerator: An efficient walk-in refrigerator increases the amount of food that can be received, stored, and distributed.	Hannaford Supermarket
\$30,000	Walk-in Freezer: An efficient walk-in freezer replaces the Center's current collection of seven aging freezers tucked into every corner of the basement.	Maine Family Federal Credit Union
\$25,000	Shower: A basic hygiene measure that many of us take for granted, the shower will increase dignity, reduce shame, and improve the health of our homeless guests.	John and Doris Bonneau
\$25,000	Laundry: From rain-soaked blankets to soiled clothing, access to laundry for both guests' possessions and the Center's donation room is long overdue. An unmet need in downtown Lewiston.	Available
\$25,000	Breakroom: This shared space will provide our hard-working staff and volunteers with a private and rejuvenating space to help reduce burnout and improve wellbeing and connection.	Marnie and Brian DuBois
\$25,000	Breakfast Bar: A countertop with upper and lower cabinets and two sinks, located in the Day Shelter. Coffee, fruit, and pastries will be served here each morning and our homeless guests can fill water bottles and microwave food.	Richard C. and Jean J. Reed
